The California Bass Chapter Federation will be hosting this years Junior State Championship at Lake Millerton. The event will take place on May 30th. 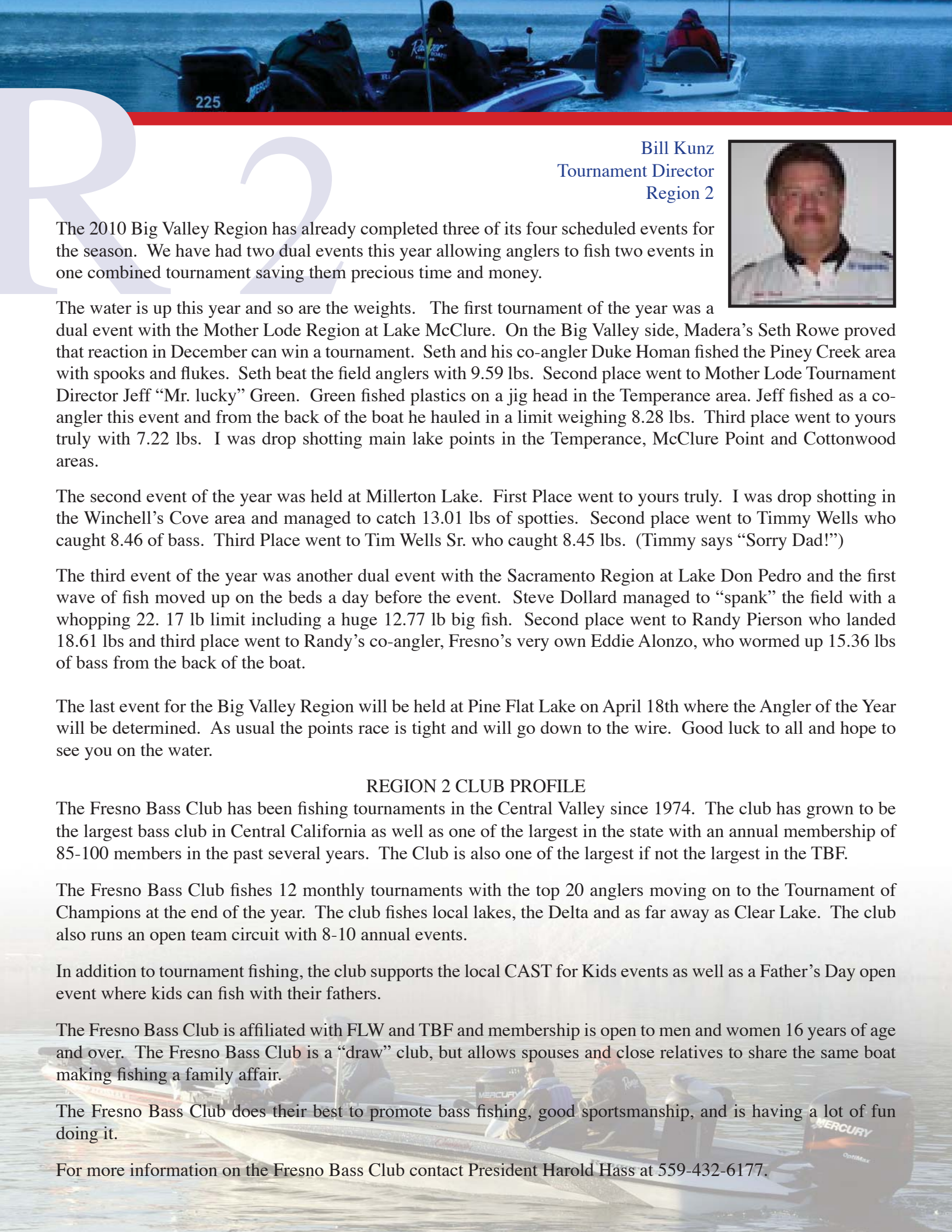

The 2010 Big Valley Region has already completed three of its four scheduled events for the season. We have had two dual events this year allowing anglers to fish two events in one combined tournament saving them precious time and money.

The water is up this year and so are the weights. The first tournament of the year was a dual event with the Mother Lode Region at Lake McClure. On the Big Valley side, Madera's Seth Rowe proved that reaction in December can win a tournament. Seth and his co-angler Duke Homan fished the Piney Creek area with spooks and flukes. Seth beat the field anglers with 9.59 lbs. Second place went to Mother Lode Tournament Director Jeff "Mr. lucky" Green. Green fished plastics on a jig head in the Temperance area. Jeff fished as a co-angler this event and from the back of the boat he hauled in a limit weighing 8.28 lbs. Third place went to yours truly with 7.22 lbs. I was drop shotting main lake points in the Temperance, McClure Point and Cottonwood areas.

The second event of the year was held at Millerton Lake. First Place went to yours truly. I was drop shotting in the Winchell's Cove area and managed to catch 13.01 lbs of spotties. Second place went to Timmy Wells who caught 8.46 of bass. Third Place went to Tim Wells Sr. who caught 8.45 lbs. (Timmy says "Sorry Dad!")

The third event of the year was another dual event with the Sacramento Region at Lake Don Pedro and the first wave of fish moved up on the beds a day before the event. Steve Dollard managed to "spank" the field with a whopping 22.17 lb limit including a huge 12.77 lb big fish. Second place went to Randy Pierson who landed 18.61 lbs and third place went to Randy's co-angler, Fresno's very own Eddie Alonzo, who wormed up 15.36 lbs of bass from the back of the boat.

The last event for the Big Valley Region will be held at Pine Flat Lake on April 18th where the Angler of the Year will be determined. As usual the points race is tight and will go down to the wire. Good luck to all and hope to see you on the water.

### REGION 2 CLUB PROFILE

The Fresno Bass Club has been fishing tournaments in the Central Valley since 1974. The club has grown to be the largest bass club in Central California as well as one of the largest in the state with an annual membership of 85-100 members in the past several years. The Club is also one of the largest if not the largest in the TBF.

The Fresno Bass Club fishes 12 monthly tournaments with the top 20 anglers moving on to the Tournament of Champions at the end of the year. The club fishes local lakes, the Delta and as far away as Clear Lake. The club also runs an open team circuit with 8-10 annual events.

In addition to tournament fishing, the club supports the local CAST for Kids events as well as a Father's Day open event where kids can fish with their fathers.

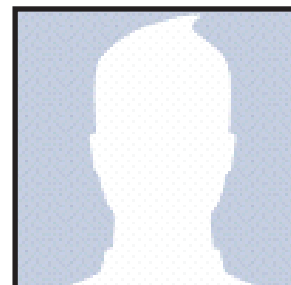

The Shasta region season is 1/2 way over with 2 early events on Lake Shasta completed. This year's participation has been less than expected, and is a disappointment for all of us. We tried to limit the travel and expenses by holding 3 tournneys on Lake Shasta this year, but it has not had a positive effect on turnout. There are many veteran fisherman of the Bass Federation that are missing this year. The current state of the economy explains some, but not all of the missing participants. We are continuing to introduce new fisherman to the Bass Federation, but we are losing many others. We hope to expand our lake selections for next year in hopes to increase our draw and participation. Clear Lake will be a prime target again for 2011.

This year's race for AOY is bunched up at top with non-boater Gunnar Hobbs leading all contestants; showing that he is consistent from the back of the boat. Gunnar is followed closely by a strong field of veterans (Gordon Gienapp, Phil Garcia, and Tony Thomasy) and some relative new comers to the Bass Federation (Aaron Agner and Sean Kimble). With just 2 events left, every point is really important; so good luck to everyone.

Our 3rd tournament of the year will take place in March, again on Lake Shasta, but contestants will be faced with a new challenge this time – water. Yes, there is water everywhere at Lake Shasta. The lake has filled up to within 30ft of full and there is more water in the lake than most contestants have ever seen. When asked, local resident and longtime Federation fisherman Tony Thomasy said “The lake is fishing big. There is so much more bank to fish now; guys are not going to recognize the lake or their favorite fishing spots. I haven't fished the lake at this level in over 5 years. It's going to be a challenge.” Good luck to all those fishing the event; it should be a great bite.

Our 4th and last event of the season is going to be a really exciting tournament. We will be on Trinity Lake on June 13th. This is going to be a slug-fest with quality smallmouth being caught and large black bass for kickers. Region 5 seasoned veterans are already planning and expecting to go fish all week, just for the expected fun of it. We typically all camp out with RVs and cabin rentals; having a fishing experience unlike most other tournaments. 5lb smallmouth are common here and 7lb largemouth kickers are routine, if you know how to target them. Winning weights are expected to exceed 25lbs. The excitement for this tourney comes from the fact that this is the only weekend of the year (except the winter months) that you can fish Trinity for 5 fish and fish all day in a tournament event. Trinity is a lake with a 2 fish limit thru most of the spawn, and once the limit is over, the state regulations kick in for summer events, this is the only weekend that straddles these two restrictions and allows R5 to fish a full event. If you have never fished Trinity and want to experience a great fishery with arm-jerking bites from smallmouth, come fish with us. You won't be disappointed. Good Luck to everyone in the remaining 2010 season.

**Cottonwood Bass Team** is a north state club that has been alive for more than two decades. This is a club rich in tradition. Over the years they have worked with various organizations enhancing habitat, hosting benefit tournaments, “ take a kid fishing”, supporting the handicap. 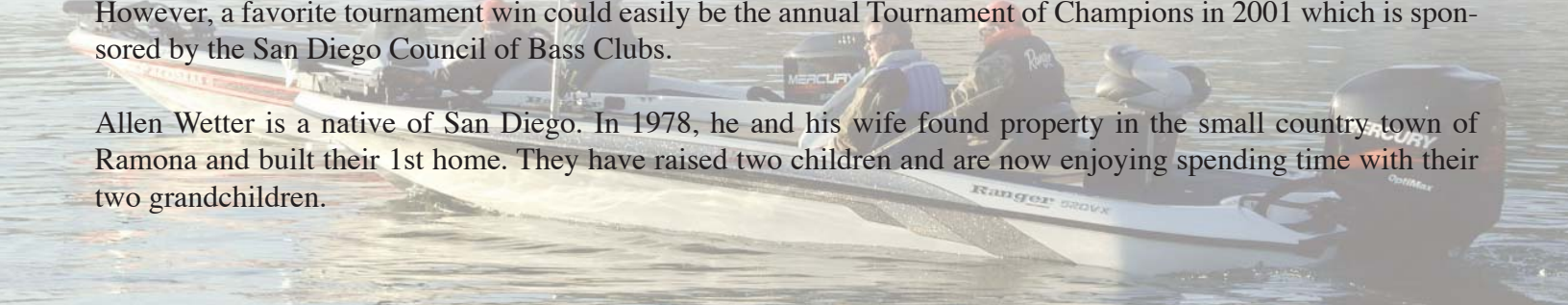

Rain was in the forecast for the March 6th. Tournament, at Lake Piru. The forecast was correct for a change and some anglers were able to take advantage of this and catch the bigger pre spawn fish that all the anglers were after, at this the second event of the 2009/2010 season for region 7 of the California Bass Federation.

As weigh in time approached rumor was going around on the water that many anglers had at least 1 fish over 5 pounds to go with a limit in the livewell. As usual the scales would tell the truth and a winner would be decided after the scales were closed. One of the first anglers to weigh in set the mark high for big fish as well as overall weight for the day. Walter Kondrecki set the scales on fire with a 5 fish limit total weight of 12.81 pounds good enough for 4th place after all was finished. Included in his limit was a nice pre spawn 6 pound even bass. Many other anglers tried but could not bump him from the top spot until Lance Karafelas came up to the scale with a 5 fish limit weighing 15.61 pounds. Lance had all nice 3 pound fish in his limit but just no big fish to carry him to the top spot for the day, Lance ended the day in third place. Not long after Lance weighed in, Tony Capparelli came to the scales with 3 bags in tow. This brought the crowd alive and interest perked up. Tony ended the day with a total weight of 16.86 pounds and a big fish of 4.72 pounds. That put him in first for the moment with 1 more angler to weigh in. That Angler was Jerry Ballesteros. Jerry was bringing 4 bags to the scales and 3 of those bags had 1 fish each in them. The crowd massed around the tub and scale to get a peek at what was going to be weighed in. Jerry picked out his big fish and once it was put on the scale the crowd congratulated Jerry for catching a 10.10 pound fish.



That is the first fish over 10 pounds to be weighed in during a region 7 tournament in over 3 years. Jerry's other 4 fish were added into the bag and his total weight was an astounding 27.57 pounds. That total weight was good enough for first place and Big Fish of the tournament.

The award ceremony followed not too long after weigh in and thanks to 2 of our Anglers, Whitney Uyeda maker of Rock Hopper Buzzbaits and spinnerbaits, and Troy Lindner donating Rapala and suffix product, First and Second out of the money were able to get some great goodies for there time on the water.

# *On the water with Region 7 angler*

## *“One punch Proctor”*



At an early age Dan Proctor knew that bass fishing was going to be one of his life long passions. He reflectively mentioned to me one day that “I remember getting up real early to watch Bassmasters on TV, but I never thought that bass fishing could teach so many lessons about life.

Dan started fishing as soon as he could hold a rod. Spending time with his father and brother on the water are amongst some of his fondest childhood memories. In the early 90’s, Dan and his brother started renting aluminum boats, going to various lakes and mimicking techniques that he saw guys in bass boats do including standing up on the seat and shaking a worm. “I remember standing and loosing my balance a lot, but I knew someday, somehow, I was going to get a real boat.”

1997 was a monumental year for Dan. He and his brother managed to save enough money to purchase a Bass Cat Pantera 2. In the same year Dan met Brian Bailey. Together they pushed each other in friendly battles on the water, and as a result the competitive nature in Dan and Brian blossomed. This bond and mutual respect would continue for many years to come.

The year 2000 was a pivotal time for Dan both good and bad. The good was that he married Charise, his sweetheart of 7 years which many considered to be his “rock”. The bad was the realization of what he had yet to face, it wasn’t about worm colors or water temps, but his health. At the age of 25, standing only 5’6” Dan weighed in at a staggering 375 pounds. With the prospect of heart attacks, diabetes and high blood pressure in the near future, Dan decided to seek help. Thanks to the encouragement from his wife, friends and family, Dan joined a weight loss program and over the next 2 years he lost 210 pounds. His example has led many anglers in Region 7 to take an active roll in their personal well being by enacting change for the better.



As the weight went down his confidence went up as an angler. He started fishing the TBF as a co-angler in 2007 only breaking into the top 10 once, but with his new found confidence he became a boater in 2010. With multiple top ten finishes this year alone, he’s secured a position at the State Championship at Lake Havasu. Dan is looking forward to having a chance at qualifying to represent California at the Western Regionals in 2011

One of the most memorable experiences for Dan would have to be the Top Stick and Top Stick Joe’s Pro Am’s this past September. He fished as a non-boater in Top Stick and took 3rd, a few weeks later he and partner fished the Top Stick Joe’s as a team and won the 2 day event. “I learned so much during those two tournaments because of two great mentors, Region 7 tournament director Ray Leyerly, and professional fisherman John Barron, both teaching me valuable lessons about fishing and the importance in believing in yourself. “I’m very lucky to have them as friends,” Dan commented.

I’ve known Dan since 2005 and when asked to describe him as a person many words come to mind. Driven, dedicated, humble, funny, inspirational, a great competitor and fishing partner. He’s a great father, husband and friend as many will attest to this. Few have the courage to take the road less traveled, with insurmountable odds-who could blame them?
